President's Report

At our last meeting before our summer break on May 1 at 7:30p.m. at the Community House (800 S. Buchanan St.), we will be discussing our draft Neighborhood Conservation Plan. The draft Neighborhood Conservation Plan is based on your answers to the survey that was distributed to households last fall. The County will use the Plan to help prioritize funding for projects for the neighborhood.

The Plan is in draft form and ready for the neighborhood to review, comment, change and hopefully approve. The draft is up on the web site at www.bscl.org. We are also distributing a summary around the neighborhood to give you a chance to read it before the May 1 meeting. At that meeting we will be discussing the draft and making final changes. If you can't make the meeting, you can also drop comments off at the Community House, send them to Randy Swart at 4611 7th St. South, or email them to randy@bscl.org. If you have not seen the draft yet, give Randy a call at 703-521-2080 and he will drop off a copy for you.

For those who couldn't make our last meeting, we listened to a presentation by Bob Eisenberg of Heritage Properties, which will be developing the former Bob & Edith's site at the intersection Buchanan St. and Columbia Pike. Mr. Eisenberg indicated that he anticipates building a 4-story building on the land, with retail stores on the ground floor and apartments. There will also be an underground park-

ing garage. Traffic is anticipated to exit and enter onto Buchanan St.

We also discussed that the intersection at Buchanan and Columbia Pike is scheduled to be redesigned and streetscape improvements are anticipated to be completed in the next 18 months or so, which could help eliminate some of the danger at that intersection.

We also passed a resolution and submitted joint comments with the Alcova Heights neighborhood on the proposed National Guard expansion to their facility on George Mason Drive. Our concerns primarily stem from the fact that onsite parking facilities are not anticipated to be completed until a few years after the expansion itself. The comment letter we sent to the County is available on the website www.bscl.org.

Finally, we along with other neighborhoods have requested that the Northern Virginia Park Authority permit the Arlington Police to use their Arlington Park Safe Program (which gives the police the authority to enforce the criminal trespassing statute on the subject property) on the W&OD trail and park. This would give the police an additional and more effective tool to deal with the persistent public safety problems in the area of the W&OD trail, Four Mile Run, and Columbia Pike. We anticipate that the Park Authority will grant an 18-month trial period for this program at their Board meeting later this month.



22204 Holds Its Own

More than \$14.2 million dollars worth of homes were sold in the Pike's 22204 zip code in February of 2008, up 7% over February 2007.

The number of homes sold also increased from 30 to 33, including 22 single family homes and 11 condo/coop units. However, average days on the market grew from 74 to 110, and the average sale price declined slightly from \$443,768 to \$432,409.

Jeff Payne of Prudential Carruthers Realtors, who provided the MLS data, said "Arlington and 22204 continue to perform well and show that real estate here is a good long term investment."

Arlington residents:

On March 6th, Arlington County experienced a noteworthy house fire that resulted in: one fire fatality, injuries to other occupants of the home, significant structural damage, and injuries to one of our firefighters. In light of this tragedy, I would like to remind all Arlington residents of the importance of having a working smoke alarm on every level of your home and inside each sleeping area.

A properly maintained smoke alarm nearly doubles your chances of survival in a residential structure fire. To ensure that your smoke alarms are functioning properly, depress the "test" button monthly and change the batteries twice annually. Furthermore, a smoke alarm older than ten years should be replaced.

I would like to take this opportunity to inform all residents of our *Operation FireSafe* program, which provides free smoke alarms to owner occupied residences. Simply call 703.228.4646 and leave your name, address and telephone number. A fire department representative will contact you to schedule an appointment to install smoke alarms in your home. The following safety tips are simple actions that you can take to ensure the safety of your family.

- ❖ Create an escape plan from your home. Make sure that your plan includes two ways out of every room and a meeting place outside.
- ❖ Practice your plan with children, visiting guests and relatives.
- ❖ Never disable an alarm or "borrow" its battery for another use.
- ❖ Test smoke alarms monthly.
- ❖ Assume that a ringing alarm indicates that there is an incident and evacuate immediately.
- ❖ Never go back inside for any reason! Meet the firefighters outside to inform us of anyone trapped.

On behalf of the Arlington County Fire Department, I implore all residents to take this opportunity to protect your family. If you need assistance with your smoke alarms or have any questions, please contact our Fire Prevention Office at 703.228.4644.
