## President's Report

As spring is just around the corner and creatures start to emerge from winter hibernation in Barcroft, it seems an appropriate time to discuss a not-very-fun but necessary topic at our next BSCL meeting on **Thursday, March 5, at 7:30pm**—namely, **rodent and varmint control**. We have invited County health and code inspectors to join us for this meeting. If you are seeing an undue amount of rodents or other varmints in your corner of the neighborhood, please give me an email at [heidi@bscl.org](mailto:heidi@bscl.org) prior to the meeting so I can follow up with County staff. We will discuss issues with particular segments of the neighborhood which the County has been pursuing and also what we can do to prevent future issues.

At our last meeting, we were joined by County staff to discuss forming a design group comprised of neighbors interested in helping review **designs for the park area at the WO&D Trail and Columbia Pike**. The group had a meeting scheduled for the last week in February to review the County landscape designer's initial plans. We hope to have a final plan that we can bring before the BSCL for approval at our May meeting. This project will be funded by the County as our first Neighborhood Conservation project from our new neighborhood conservation plan.

Neighbor **Chris Ditta** also joined us to discuss the

Barcroft Elementary School PTA's initiative to build a **running track** behind the school, around the playing field. The PTA is currently fundraising for this initiative. Neighbors brought up a number of questions/concerns for the PTA/School to consider in designing the project, such as whether the track would create more water runoff onto neighboring properties, concerns regarding noise from increased use of the area in non-school hours, whether sustainable materials would be used in building the track, general maintenance and safety concerns, and how to keep folks off the track after dark for everyone's safety. Mr. Ditta indicated that it is not the intent of the project to change the scope of use of the area—for example, no lights will be added and, like the playground in general, the track will not be permitted to be used after dark.

The BSCL is forming an ad hoc committee to facilitate closer communication with the School and PTA on this and future projects which may affect the community at large. The committee will meet on an as-needed basis. We hope to schedule our first joint meeting with School/PTA representatives in mid-March. ### Fox Startles Dog Walkers

Several Barcroft dog walkers report being charged by a large red fox. Is it rabid? No, it's probably looking for love. Alonzo Abugattas, acting supervisor of Long Branch Nature Center, says that this is mating season. The foxes have raging hormones and are "a little crazy" right now. They are territorial and an approaching dog is: 1) a potential mate or 2) a competitor for mates and/or territory. A fox wants the dog to know that it is the owner of the territory and will show off to scare others away. The fox is probably totally focused on the dog and not the human attached to it.

Alonzo says that there are three foxes they are aware of in our woods. They come to the Nature Center to eat leftover peanut butter put out for flying squirrels each night. One is a classic red fox with a bushy tail. A hurt red fox limps from an injured front foot, and the third is "mangy" with a skimpy tail. Fox are normally shy, but raging hormones can cause them to act abnormally. They are yelping in the woods at night, and should come back to their senses in a few weeks.

The fox will rarely come in physical contact with others. If it charges, make loud noises and wave your arms to scare it off. If it actually tries to bite, call Animal Control. The Nature Center, by law, may not trap or noose wildlife. Fox will attack if they are sick or have kits near by. Our dogs can be more

dangerous to the fox than they are to us. A normally well behaved Barcroft dog that is walked off leash (not recommended and against the law) chased a fox kit. Thankfully the kit escaped to safety under the Nature Center, but it could have been injured by the dog and a confrontation with mom would be likely. That would have been dangerous for all involved.

There are some reports of a coyote in our area. A 6<sup>th</sup> street neighbor reported seeing one trot down his street 2 years ago, and there are other reports of occasional sighting in recent few months. Alonzo says that coyotes are known to be in North Arlington near the Potomac but they are still unconfirmed in South Arlington. Eastern coyotes are large, about the size of a collie. Unlike their Western relatives, they do not howl at night. They will eat cats and small dogs, and are sneaky about stealing pets from a yard when the owner isn't looking. It's wise to keep cats inside and supervise small dogs.

## Neighbors Really Do Matter

We know that young people who report having caring adults in their lives are less apt to get themselves into trouble with drugs and alcohol. And we know most adults believe it's important to support, guide and encourage young people in their neighborhood.

Even so, other than their own children, relatively few adults are actively engaged in the lives of young people. Here in Arlington, only 40% of teens report experiencing a caring neighborhood. Maybe that's because we, as adults, just don't know how to begin.

### **Here are a few simple ideas for making a positive difference in a young person's life:**

- Start with a smile: it's a great way to connect! Children - especially teens - need to know they are not invisible.
- Get to know the names of the children in your neighborhood – and call them by name.
- Need help with yard work or technology or childcare? Ask a neighborhood teen to help you. That's a great way to build a relationship.
- If you see kids doing something dangerous, don't ignore it. Young people are counting on all adults to help keep them safe.
- If you are a parent, help your children and your neighbors get to know and respect each other.

### **Caring Adults and Caring Neighborhoods are Prevention!**

The **Arlington Partnership for Children, Youth and Families** is working to ensure that all young people have the strengths or "assets" they need to become caring, healthy, successful adults. It is currently leading a community coalition to reduce and prevent teen alcohol and drug use. The Arlington data references the March, 2006 *Assets Profiles of Student Life Survey* administered to a random sample of 2300 APS 6<sup>th</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> grade students.

## GET READY FOR ARLINGTON'S ANNUAL NATIVE TREE GIVEAWAY

Get ready to place your order with Barcroft civic association contact Elizabeth Rives for your free native trees from Arlington County this spring!

The two species available this year are the Bur Oak (*Quercus macrocarpa*) and the American Filbert, or Hazelnut (*Corylus americana*). The Bur Oak is a very large deciduous shade tree and the American hazelnut is a smaller multi-stemmed shrub with a rounded top and an open, often wide-spreading base. The trees will be delivered as small "whips" in 5-gallon containers, making them easier to transplant with a greater chance for future growth success. Both specimens are ideal selections for starting your own Backyard Wildlife Habitat.

The Bur Oak is often described as a "behemoth," growing as large as 90 feet, so please be sure you have enough space in your yard for this magnificent, slow-growing, long-lived (200 years) species. That means at least 10 feet from a building, overhead wires, or smaller trees and 20 feet from large trees. If you have the space, the bur oak has a lovely rounded shape, is tolerant of a variety of moisture and soil conditions, prefers full sun, and doesn't have serious pest problems. In addition to its notable strength, it is a splendid tree for urban landscapes because it provides acorns for squirrels, has dense shade, and is resistant to air pollution and heat stress. The American Filbert, also commonly known as the American Hazelnut, is a multi-stemmed, deciduous shrub that grows 8-10' high and wide – often larger. Because of its size, it is adapts well to naturalizing

and other non-formal areas. The shrub tolerates a wide variety of soil conditions and thrives under full sun or in light shade. And, of course, it bears annual, abundant crops of small, sweet-tasting nuts valued by both humans and wildlife only 2-3 years after planting.
