

President's Report

As the summer election season is heating up, the Democratic candidates for our Virginia district delegate seat will join us for a debate at our next BSCL meeting, on **Thursday, April 2 at 7:30 pm at the Community House** (800 S.

Buchanan). The Democratic primary is on June 9, 2009. Please bring your questions for the candidates to what is sure to be a spirited debate!

Following up on a couple of items from our last meeting, we were joined by representatives of the County Public Health and Code

Enforcement divisions to discuss measures for rodent control. We also were joined by representatives from the National Guard. The discussion focused primarily on two areas--2nd Street South (rat/racoons/birds) and the area bordering Arlington Hall park (rodents fleeing construction at National Guard).

Regarding 2nd Street, the County has informed us that they are in the process of taking action to control the rodent issue on that street. This will take some time. The County representatives will join us again at our **May 7 BSCL meeting** for an update and also to discuss **mosquito control.** The County continues to encourage folks neighboring the area to put out bait for rats (please use bait boxes so only rats can get the bait). Their inspection of the area found rats that have eaten the bait, so it is working. Rats are prolific procreators, so it is important to eradicate them completely.



Regarding the Arlington Hall area, we are working with Alcova Heights to set up a joint community meeting (probably in the next month) with the National Guard and State Department, to discuss rodent and

other issues you may wish to discuss with those entities. We may not be able to get a notice in the next newsletter about when this meeting will be, depending on timing, but will put up signs in the neighborhood and send an email to the chat list (you can sign up for the chat list at Yahoo! Groups).

Looking ahead to our May 7 meeting, we will be holding elections for several positions-including President and Vice President. Please let me or one of the other existing officers know if you have an interest in serving the BSCL in an elected position.

AROUND THE NEIGHBORHOOD

Barcrofter Jenny Lindenauer is the director of the a family literacy program called "Even Start" which is located at Barcroft School. The program reaches out to local families with children ages newborn to 8. It is funded by grants and by Arlington Public Schools.

Each day from 9 AM to 2:30 PM parents come to Barcroft to learn English, along with parenting skills. Care is provided for babies, and there is a preschool program. The curriculum for parents and children is integrated, so they all learn similar vocabulary and themes such as aspects of nutrition.

The Even Start program began five years ago. Currently 48 families are participating. Home visits are frequent. Although the program is available for all of Arlington, most participants walk to the school, even from as far away as Carlin Springs. Others come by metro bus. These families right now are experiencing the loss of jobs and income.

Barcroft neighbors can assist this program in a number of ways – by donating household items and also by volunteering.

There is always a need for new or used baby items, clothing, books, educational toys, furniture (especially shelving), baby gates, household items, food, etc. There is a huge need for car seats. Used is fine if they have never been in an accident and meet certain safety requirements.

Volunteers are needed to help care for the babies and toddlers, and to help participants practice their English.

Students Walk to Fight Diabetes

Barcroft Elementary is gathering their students, staff, families and neighbors for their third annual 5K School Walk for Diabetes, an event of the American Diabetes Association. On **Saturday, April 18th**, registration begins at 7:45am. Then at 8:15am the warm-up and walk will begin from the school.

Approximately 20.8 million children and adults have diabetes in United States, and one in three babies born today will develop diabetes in their lifetime. Not only are students raising funds, but they are also actively learning life-long lessons about the seriousness of diabetes and how healthy eating and exercising can help prevent the disease. The school receives a percentage of the funds raised to purchase needed physical education equipment and school medical supplies.

The idea for the walk was developed by the students after learning about a Barcroft parent who developed diabetes as an adolescent. Nearly 1,500 schools participated in School Walk for Diabetes last year.



\$8000 Home Buyer Tax Credit Basics The American Recovery & Reinvestment Act of 2009 offers an \$8000 maximum tax credit for first-time homebuyers buying homes as their primary residence between January 1 and December 1, 2009. A First-Time Home Buyer is anyone who has not owned a home within the last 3 years. The income number is always based on Modified ADJUSTED GROSS INCOME (MAGI). Single taxpayer: MAGI of \$75,000 or less, Married taxpayer: MAGI of \$150,000 or less. (Always seek competent tax advice!) There is also a provision for those single and married who EXCEED the income limits to claim a partial tax credit. A "tax credit formula" has been created to determine the dollar amount. For example, if a single tax payer's MAGI is \$82,000, their partial tax credit is \$5200.

A FTHB can borrow the dollar amount of the expected tax credit from a relative and pay it back when the tax credit is received. It could be used towards down payment and closing costs. FHA and VA loan programs allow a relative to cosign, with FTHB getting the credit.

VA 100% loans are now available to \$812,500 in the DC area. Higher loan amounts are also available with a down payment equal to 25% of the purchase price above \$812,500. The FHA has just implemented new limits in March 2009 for its loan guarantee programs that will allow it to insure mortgages of up to \$729,750 with only 3.5% down payment. This loan cap also applies to the FHA 203K renovation loan program, where you can purchase a fixer upper home with only 3.5% total down payment, and finance improvement costs into the mortgage up to the \$729,750 loan limit.
