

March BSCL President's Report By Bryant Monroe

Our neighborhood has been wrestling with several important issues in recent months. I'll outline the key points, and ask that you join us at the BSCL meeting on March 3 at 7 PM for discussion of all three issues! First, our heartfelt thanks to *Eric and Annie Harold* for bringing back the Barcroft Spaghetti Dinner. It was a packed house on Jan. 30 raising over \$350 for the Community House Fund! More important, it brought a full house of Barcroft neighbors together for a great afternoon.

4616 South 8th Street House Burning

As you know the burned house on South 8th was finally taken down. With the demolition complete, we are looking to the Arlington Civic Federation to continue their efforts to change the County's policy on burning vacant homes for training purposes. *Randy Swart* and *Scott Brinitzer* will keep us posted on their progress.

APAH Request for Fire Turnaround on Four Mile Run Park Property (Buchanan Gardens) On Nov. 14, 2009, the Arlington County Board approved the Arlington Partnership for Affordable Housing (APAH) application to acquire and refurbish the Buchanan Gardens apartments (located near the Pike on Buchanan Street). The County provided financial assistance and approved a "Use Permit" in 2009 enabling the project to proceed. As many of you know the BSCL passed two resolutions supporting this project, and our neighborhood conservation plan encourages improvements to this site. APAH has now further requested approval to "encroach" on Four Mile Run Park to construct a fire turnaround. The County's Fire Marshall has levied this requirement.

I have begun to understand some of the details, and am glad we'll have a chance to talk with APAH and County staff at out March meeting. Barcroft neighbors, while supportive of this project, are concerned about the apparent loss of parkland. Please see the BSCL website for additional material on their request and community concerns. The APAH request is scheduled to go before the County Board at their March 12 meeting.

Expansion of the National Guard Bureau/State Department

Last month's meeting focused on the growth of the National Foreign Affairs Training Center (NFATC) and the Army National Guard Readiness Center (ANGRC) at Rt. 50 and George Mason Dr. We held a joint meeting with the Alcova Heights Civic Association to meet with representatives from the NFATC, ANGRC and Arlington County. The energetic discussion underscored the parking impact on Barcroft so far. With 1200 new staff coming to these facilities in the next 6 months, it will be imperative for us stay focused on this issue. As a result of the questions and points made by neighborhood residents, a committee will be formed with Barcroft and Alcova Heights residents, and key staff from the County, ANGRC and NFATC. I appreciate the great work done by *Heidi Wicker* on these difficult issues and coordinating with County and the State department and National Guard. Our thanks also go the County, ANGRC and NFFATC staff who will help find ways to address our concerns. More details to follow!

County Will Straighten Buchanan

After more than two years of negotiations, Arlington County has purchased a piece of the Goodwill parking lot. Sometime this year they will straighten out the intersection of Buchanan and the Pike. There will be a big improvement in pedestrian safety by eliminating the offset.

Barcrofters had initially been concerned about increasing cut-through traffic by straightening the intersection, but that was before traffic calming in the neighborhood. Traffic calming reduced our cut-throughs by about a third. We asked that the south side be restricted to one lane, but the County is installing two lanes--one for right turns and straight-through up the hill on Buchanan, and the other for left turns onto Columbia Pike toward Baileys Crossroads.

County staffers are apologetic for the condition of the paving as they work on the Wakefield to Four Mile Run streetscape improvements, but say they can't pave with the temperatures as low as they have been.

In Memoriam

On January 29, 2011, Barcroft lost one of our long-time residents. **William (Bill) Wyckoff**, celebrated his 99th birthday in January. He passed away in Louisa, VA, where he moved in late 2007 to be near his daughter.

Bill came to Barcroft in 1953 and lived at 4630 S. 5th St. with his wife, Irene, and three children: Judy, Chuck, and Nancy. His kids attended Barcroft Elementary and Wakefield High School in the 1950s and '60s.. Irene passed away in the 1980s. Bill enjoyed visiting with his grown kids, ten grandchildren and great-granddaughter, and for many years would travel to Louisa, VA., Florida, and New Hampshire to visit with them. He's remembered as being a helpful and caring handyman neighbor.

Bill was born in NJ, spent his early years there, then moved to Washington, DC. He graduated from McKinley High School, participating in sports and serving as a major in the cadet corp.

Bill served his community and his nation as a member of the Metropolitan Police Force and then the Capital Police, and lastly as a member of the Uniformed Service of the US Secret Service, serving at the White House. After retiring, he worked in construction and then with the Small Business Administration, eventually retiring permanently.

Preparedness Training

Emergency Preparedness and Response Training Begins in March

This eight-session course, sponsored by the Arlington County Citizen Corps Council, Office of Emergency Management and Fire Department, covers disaster preparedness, disaster medical operations, light search and rescue, team organization, disaster psychology, fire suppression and terrorism. It follows a FEMA/DHS curriculum being used around the globe.

To-date, over 480 individuals have completed CERT training in Arlington County. It is open to Arlington residents who are at least 18 years of age (16 if accompanied by a parent) and able to participate in all aspects of the training, some of which requires lifting and carrying. The training is free. All classes meet at the Arlington County Fire Department Training Academy in Shirlington.

Her picture was in the paper and she was invited to attend the annual luncheon in DC with her coaches and parents—a very memorable experience.

Mary Lynn's best event is the balance beam but clearly she is proficient in all events. She is considering college gymnastics, but thinks she might want to branch out into other activities. She also enjoys diving.
