Remembering Mrs. Lila Wilson



Longtime Barcrofter Lila Wilson died in February 2011 at the age of 96 in Leesburg. Her husband Chester Wilson, a pharmacist, died a number of years ago. They lived on the corner of S. Abingdon and 4th Streets in the brown brick house on the corner by the mailbox.

The Wilsons moved to Barcroft in the 1940s, They were probably among the original residents. They had 4 children and several grandchildren. Their family attended the Arlington Forest United Methodist Church many years ago.

Back in the 50's and 60's when children waited for the school bus at 4th and Abingdon, on rainy days, Lila would invite the girls into her house. The boys would gather on the porch of the stone house across the street. (Frank Wyckoff lived there back then; he was the boys age). We would watch for the bus and run out to catch it when it came. The driver usually knew where we were.

Lila was a member of the neighborhood K Klub. She and Chester would host the Klub on special occasions with Valentine parties and Halloween parties. A lot of fun!

Progress at Buchanan Gardens

Buchanan Garden Apartment Construction is well under way. The Arlington Partnership for Affordable Housing (APAH) purchased Buchanan Gardens in 2009. Built in 1949, this 11-building garden apartment community is undergoing major renovations that started in Spring 2011. Thirty apartments are included in Phase One, which will be completed very soon. Phase Two will be completed in winter 2011 and Phase Three will follow in spring 2012. Residents, relocated temporarily to Columbia Grove or other locations, will return to newly renovated apartments including new systems, new finishes and "bump outs" to increase the number of family-size units. When complete. Buchanan Gardens will also have a new playground and community center.

Work is progressing well and they are doing their best to stick to their tight building schedule. A model is currently available for viewing and I took the opportunity to see the transformation with Christopher Donald the Director of Real Estate Development for APAH. You Can Get There From Here—By Bus!

If you have never taken the bus you may find the system daunting. You've probably noticed there are two bus systems here in Arlington: 1) the larger Metrobus system that serves the District, Virginia, and Maryland, and 2) the smaller green and white Arlington Transit (ART) busses that operate only in Arlington.

Fares

It costs \$1.50 to get on either bus if you're using a SmartTrip® card. If you want to pay cash you pay 20 cents more on the Metrobus but not the ART bus. With a SmartTrip® card, once you board a bus you've got two hours to ride as many busses as you'd like at no additional cost (except to Dulles Airport). If you transfer to Metrorail you get a discount of 50¢ on your rail fare.

Anyone older than 65 or with disabilities

and anyone with a Medicare card can ride for half price. **Teens** with middle or high school IDs can also ride for half price with the iRide Teen Discount. They must use cash or green iRide tokens from The Commuter Store (branches in Shirlington, Ballston Commons Mall, Rosslyn Metro, or Crystal City Shops).

How do you know where the bus is going?

- 1. The destination is on the front of the bus.
- 2. Review (and order) bus schedules online.
- 3. Ask the driver.

Neighborhood Owls

A Nocturnal Neighbor

A prominent, year-round resident of Northern Virginia and of our Arlington forests is the Great Horned Owl (*Bubo virginianus*). First noted in the Virginia Colonies of the New World, it is believed to have been named in honor of the 'Virgin Queen', Queen Elizabeth I. While common across many varied North American habitats and ecoregions, the Great Horned Owl is the only member of the genus *Bubo* in the Western Hemisphere. It's the largest of the owls native to Virginia and only slightly smaller than the tallest owl in North America, the Great Grey Owl.

While sometimes seen out during the day, they are naturally nocturnal hunters favoring the hours just before midnight and again just before dawn. Behind their piercing gaze is a head that can swivel 180-190° with binocular vision and deadly accurate night vision. Aiding their amazingly keen eyesight is an excellent sense of hearing with slightly asymmetrical ear placement and sound that is funneled directly into their ears by their facial disc feathers. This provides them with multidimensional hearing and enables them to pinpoint sound location with incredible accuracy. The unique tufts or "horns" on their heads are composed of feathers and are not part of their actual ear or hearing structure. This rapacious raptor is a strict carnivore and is not very particular about its diet; it has been known to take small rodents, to small raptors, and birds as large as Great Blue

Herons in some instances.

They have a varied repertoire of calls, but the most recognizable adult call is a distinctive series of hoots that sounds loosely like "Who's awake? Me too?" Here in the Park we have a live Great Horned Owl Exhibit where visitors can learn more about the species in general, observe an actual "ambassador of the species", and if they time their visit towards the end of the work day, possibly even see a feeding session. Additional known owl residents of the park include a pair of Barred Owls, as well as the occasional visiting Screech Owl.
