#### The Kleczek Family of Barcroft

600 S. Taylor St. was the family homestead for the Kleczek family where Chester "Chet" Kleczek lived for 55 years. He purchased the house in 1955 with his wife, Grace, toddler daughter Paula and infant daughter Pam.. The couple had grown up, met and married in Boston where Paula was born. Then they moved to Rhode Island where Pam was born.

When they moved to Arlington for his job with Westinghouse, Grace announced "I am a Yankee and this is as far south as I'm going!" The house had no air conditioning. When the DC area summer heat arrived, they were advised by a neighbor that "when it's hot, we just sit." Grace was too active for that and soon they purchased some window air conditioners.

Three years later, they had a third daughter, Patricia (or Trish). The girls attended St. Thomas More School. To get to school, the girls usually took a bus, but sometimes they walked to school through what was then called Arlington Hall owned by the Army. There were no guards or gates. There was a tunnel under Rt. 50 for them to safely cross over to the school. Arlington Hall used to play "Reveille" every morning and "Taps" each evening. There used to be an actual bugler but later recordings were used. This could be heard throughout Barcroft.

Summer was great fun in Barcroft. Kids were out and about all day long biking, playing in the parks and in the creeks. The girls often took their lunch and spent all day at Alcova Park for a County program supervised by a woman named Mrs. Cox with arts, crafts and sports activities. In the evenings, the kids spent hours playing a game called "four square" drawn with

chalk out in the street in front of the Cichon family's house at S. 7th Rd and S. Taylor St.

There was a special place at the end of 6th St. South (now known as Grandma's Creek) with some flat rocks with a little waterfall where kids loved to have picnics and stay cool in the shade. Sometimes kids, gone for hours on end, walked to the High's Milk store at Columbia Pike and S. Dinwiddie to buy ice cream cones for 5 cents. Heading the other way, they could walk up to Glebe Rd and Columbia Pike to the library in the same shopping center where there is now a Boston Market. Sometimes they'd continue on to the Arlington Theater near S. Walter Reed to enjoy three movies for a quarter.

In the winter, after a good snow, the glorious 8th St. hill by Alcova Park was blocked off to traffic. This made a terrific sled run. The road at the bottom of the hill was long enough that sleds did not slide into traffic on George Mason Dr. A fire was built in a barrel at the top of the hill to help everyone stay warm. Often all participants enjoyed hot cocoa. The Barcroft School yard also had a popular hill for sledding.

The years went by, the girls grew up, and the family said goodbye to Grace, who passed away in 1986. Shortly after her death, Trish moved to Florida, Pam got married, and then Paula was married the following year. Chet sometimes went to Florida during the winter to visit Trish, but the Barcroft home remained his main residence. His first granddaughter, Laura, was born in 1989, and Lindsay arrived in 1993.

Though both girls are now in college, "Grandpa" Chet was like the Eveready bunny when it came to attending family dinners,

summer plays and school events with his daughters and granddaughters!

Meanwhile, back in Barcroft, there had been a fence around the home for many years. But gradually all that remained was just the front gate. In 1998, shortly after Chet's 80th birthday, his daughters asked neighbor **Sue Tennenbaum** (of "Annie's Garden" fame) to help with re-landscaping the property as a birthday present for their father. Sue and her trusty assistant, Roy, worked in the yard for several seasons. Chet and Roy were both of a similar age, and they got along well.

Sue came to know Chet as an outgoing, friendly man. One day she decided that the gate needed to reflect that outgoing nature—so she painted it a bright neon color! Before too long, Sue (and maybe some of the nearby neighbors) started to decorate the gate for holidays. There was a wreath at Christmas, eggs hanging from it at Easter time, and red/white/blue decorations for the Fourth of July!

But the gate served another purpose. A neighbor, Mr. Harwood, also lived alone further down on Taylor St. He walked by every day with his dog. As he passed, he would open the gate. When Chet saw the gate open, he would close it. Thus the two men quietly signaled to each other that "Yep, I'm OK today."

One winter evening another dog walker named "Wheeler" was passing the house. His dog stopped at the gate and simply refused to move. Exasperated, Wheeler said "What do you want?!" The dog pulled Wheeler into the yard where he discovered that Chet had fallen to the ground, was hidden in the shadows, and could

not get up. Wheeler's pug certainly earned his keep that day!


Just after Easter of 2010, another fall and related injuries caused Chet to move into a rehab center and then to assisted living. Chet had told neighbors that when he could no longer drive, he would rather pass on to the next life, and he got his wish. About five weeks after moving to assisted living, he passed away on July 21, 2010 at age 93.

His daughters, Paula, Pam and Patricia, returned to clean out their family home. Neighbors have been keeping an eye on the house and are glad that it wouldn't be sold for fear a large infill house might have been installed there.

As the girls spruced up the house, they took down the historic family gate. Trish decided to take it back to her home in Palm Harbor, Florida, where it now resides in HER yard!


June 30, 2012 Robert E. Lee Wedding Anniversary







The market is hot – volume, units and prices are up, time to sell is down – all great news for sellers! Northern Virginia homes sales in April increased more than 15% above April 2011 while active listing inventory decreased by 22% percent from last year. The average days on market for homes in April 2012 decreased 15% percent to 52 days, compared with 61 days in April 2011. Average sales prices increased by 5% percent from April 2011, to \$497,083, compared with last April's average of \$472,484. In April 2012 Arlington County saw an

average sales price of \$613,000, up 18% from April 2011, and active listings were down almost 19% from last year.

Buyer traffic remains strong and demand has increased due to low housing inventories, greater urgency and high rental rates. Improved confidence and low interest rates have sparked demand.
