This first incident may or may not be related to the mail thefts. Barcroft resident Cathy Cordova was shoveling her pathway and put her shovel outside her door when she went back into her home. She came out a few

hours later to finish the job but realized that her shovel had disappeared! She asked neighbors if they had borrowed it and asked on the chat list as well, but unfortunately none of them had. Cathy was shocked because nothing like this has happened in the eleven years she has lived here.

Then the mail thefts started. Helene Stebbins found a pair of baseball tickets to a

Monthly Happenings

President's Report by Eric Harold

Ok. I'm going to put my snow gear away. Kept them around a little longer, just in case. It's springtime, and our thoughts turn to...primaries! Lots of changes on the County and School Board front. Five candidates have declared for the Democratic primary for two County Board seats (Mary Hynes and Walter Tejada have decided not to run). The primary is set for June 9. Audrey Clement, ever the optimist, has thrown her name in (again) as the Green candidate. On the School Board front, Douglas Park resident Reid Goldstein has filed and relative unknown Sharon Dorsey has also filed. Both will compete for Democratic endorsement at a caucus May 14/16, after which the unsuccessful candidate will withdraw from the race (grumble...don't get me started on this).

In addition to electoral politics, the County Board and the School Board launched a broad-based, year-long community facilities planning effort. The two Boards appointed the 24-member Study Committee to lead a long-range planning effort that will, ultimately, develop framework regarding the community's future funding and facility needs. Barcroft is well represented on this committee. Bryant Monroe was asked by the County to partici-

Minnesota Twins game and thought it odd. She asked for the owner to claim them on the chat list. Scott Peterson, another Barcroft resident, put out three pieces of mail for the mail man. He was astonished to find them all in the bushes two doors down, opened and with his check missing. Fortunately the check was returned to him by a Washington and Lee student who found it in Ballston! Even the mailman said he found a few packages opened and emptied. Magdalena Slodkowaka-Barry who lives on Buchanan discovered her package opened and the contents gone! She also found someone else's open mail along 7th Street. Another neighbor, Lisa Wilson, who lives on Buchanan, found two of her packages opened, one of which contained gifts for her daughter. Several neighbors described potential suspects whom they had observed. Allison Garcia found some of her mail at the corner of 7th Street and Wakefield. She reported that some of the mail was opened and the contents were stolen. Some of the stolen mail and packages were reunited with their owners because of the chat list. It is recommended that if anyone has lost an item that they post it on the chat list.

Many victims of the thefts used the online police reporting system (http://police.arlingtonva.us/online-police-reporting-

system/). Mark Wigfield spoke with Postal Inspector Colin Spence about the recent event of mail thefts. The Postal Inspector has requested that anybody who has had their mail stolen contact him. The information is: Colin Spence (Postal Inspector, Northern Virginia Mail Theft Team), 703-280-7201 (office number), 703-698-6435 (FAX).

You can also visit their website at https://postalinspectors.uspis.gov/, scroll about halfway down and look for mail theft. If you see a mail thief at work, or if you believe your mail was stolen, call police immediately, then call Postal Inspectors at 877-876-2455 (press 3).

Flavors of the Season: Citrus

Here's a lovely spring dessert for Easter or any other day this season. We like to serve it with rainbow sherbet, but a cup of tea or glass of milk goes just as well. Happy Spring!

Grapefruit Pound Cake

Serves 16

9 ounces all-purpose flour (about 2 cups)

1 tsp baking powder

5/8 tsp salt

1 2/3 cups granulated sugar

6 T butter, softened

6 ounces 1/3-less-fat cream cheese

2 large eggs

1/4 cup canola oil

2 T grated grapefruit rind

1/2 tsp vanilla extract

1/2 cup 2% reduced-fat milk

1/2 cup fresh grapefruit juice

1 1/4 cups powdered sugar



2. Coat a 10-inch tube pan with baking spray. Weigh or lightly spoon flour into dry measuring cups; level with a knife. Combine flour, baking powder, and 1/2 tsp salt, stirring well. Place granulated sugar, butter and cream cheese in a large bowl; beat with a mixer at high speed until light and fluffy. Add eggs, 1 at a time. Beat in oil, rind, and vanilla.

3. Add flour mixture and milk alternately to batter, beginning and ending with flour. Spoon batter into pan; bake at 325 for 1 hour and 10 minutes or until a wooden pick inserted in center comes out with moist crumbs clinging. Cool in pan on a wire rack 10 minutes. Invert cake. Cool on a rack.

4. Place juice in a saucepan over me-

dium-high heat; bring to a boil. Cook until reduced to 3 T (about 4 minutes). Cool slightly. Stir in powdered sugar and remaining 1/8 tsp salt. Driz- • zle over cake.

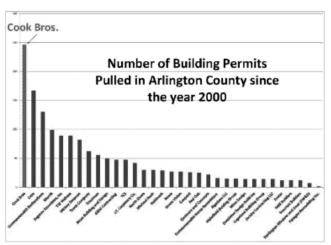

Arlington Salamanders

Lurking beneath old logs, in woodpiles, underneath stream rocks, or in quiet ponds, salamanders manage to hang on in our urban county. Small, with relatively limited mobility and no protective scales or shell, urban life is a challenge for these amphibians. As with their relatives, the frogs, most salamanders start life out in the water and live on land as adults.

A salamander might be easily mistaken for a lizard because it has four legs and a tail. Unlike lizards, which are reptiles with dry, scaly skin, salamanders have soft, moist skin. Their skin is permeable, meaning that water and chemicals can pass through it relatively easily, making them vulnerable to pesticides and other pollutants in the urban environment.

The most common salamander in Arlington is the eastern red-backed salamander. As the name suggests, many red-backed salamanders have a broad reddish (sometimes yellow) stripe down their backs. Others, though, are all dark gray or black and are called leadbacked forms.

Red-backed salamanders can sometimes be found in backyards and gardens, especially in old wood piles. Unlike most salamanders, redbacks lay their eggs on land and the young hatch out looking like miniature adults. Females usually stay with the eggs until they hatch.

Another fairly common salamander in Arlington is the northern two-lined salaman-

der. This species lives in and near streams and lay their eggs in water. The young have gills and remain aquatic for two to three years. The adults have a yellow to reddish orange back and two dark stripes along their sides.

Spotted salamanders are relatively large, sometimes reaching eight inches and can live for a decade or more. They have dark bodies spangled with bright yellow to orange spots. Spotteds spend most of their lives underground but come to small, temporary breeding pools in late February or early March to mate and lay eggs. Small populations of spotted salamanders occur near both Long Branch and Gulf Branch Nature Centers.

A small population of northern red salamanders lives in and near a little spring in the northern part of the county, not far from Four Mile Run. This is the only known remaining population in Arlington. They are spectacular orange to red salamanders with black spots and can grow to up to seven inches long. Their Arlington habitat is on private land and is protected by the property owners.

Two other salamanders recorded in Arlington in recent years include three-lined and northern dusky salamanders, though these are rare. The nature centers are conducting a Reptile and Amphibian bio-blitz on Saturday, May 9 and you can participate. We will look for and count species of reptiles and amphibians, including salamanders, in Arlington parks. Check The Snag or contact us at 703-228-6535 for details and training opportunities.

A Date with Dirt

Louis J. Glickman, a 20th century New York real estate investor and philanthropist, said, "The best investment on Earth is earth." While there's no confirmation that he cared a hoot about trees and our natural world, his words call to mind those of Wendell Berry, who as an environmental activist cares about the interconnectedness of life: "The Earth is what we all have in common." And now it's spring, the perfect time for growing things (and keeping them growing).

Now, before you grab your wallet to buy seeds or plants, take a look outside and find those tall plants made of wood that are already on or near your property. Yes, those lovely trees, not yet entirely leafed out, but still jewels that dot our planet. With the chilling months past, the timing is right for nurturing them.

To do so, the place to start is the soil, the earth itself. Since trees' root systems are anchored in the ground, knowing more about soil's characteristics and properties is important for maintaining a good home for your trees and those of your community.

Here in Barcroft, an urban neighborhood, the soil bears the mark of significant compaction, as most urbanized soil does. Various sized particles and spaces between those particles form your soil's structure (of which there are many types). Learning about your soil type and how to minimize compaction can help you keep your trees in good health.

How do you start? It's easy.

1) Your Virginia Cooperative Extension office, located at the Fairlington Community Center, has free Soil Sample boxes and Soil Sample Information Sheets to get you started. The Virginia Tech Soil Testing Lab in Blacksburg should be able to get you results within one or two weeks.

2) Manage the texture of your soil by adding organic matter to it. Mulch around the base of your trees, without touching the bark, and you will be adding to your soil's drainage capability.

During Keep America Beautiful month, do your part to invest in Barcroft's trees, and your property, by starting with their foundation, the Earth's soil. Samuel Johnson, the 18th century English writer, put it well when he said, "The future is purchased by the present." Take the time to promote the future health of all of our trees, from the smaller Eastern redbud to the mighty willow oak, by strengthening our soil today.


