

### Monthly Happenings


#### President's Report by Chris Kupczyk



## **Natureopolis**

With real estate prices on the rise in Barcroft, we mustn't forget that it's also real estate for the wildlife in our backyards and woods. We are honored to live by a nationally registered Old Age Forest. Areas of Glencarlyn Park that link us to the WO&D have not been deforested since the time of Native Americans. There are only two Old Growth Forests in Arlington. The other is in Arlington National Cemetery. Down the bike path, there is the Barcroft Magnolia Bog (the only bog in Arlington), another commodity to wildlife in our area.

The one thing Arlington County does not have is a Succession Forest -- an established area that goes through the forest life cycle: Meadow - Shrub—Woods - Meadow. This is where we human-animals play a key role in this shared habitat. It is already happening all over Barcroft. Each parcel of our land has the potential to sustain wildlife by being healthy, beautiful and herbicide/pesticide free. That's a 'spherical win'. It helps all who come in contact with our land -- from our children and pets to the bees and grass-hoppers.

"Bringing Nature Home: How You Can Sustain Wildlife With Native Plants" by Douglas W. Tallamy is a wonderful read to learn more. Living in Arlington is environmentally friendly by default because we aren't contributing to urban sprawl with long carbonomitting commutes.

It is wonderful to walk through our neighborhood and see all the diverse plants growing in yards and gardens. It gives me hope that we can live more sustainably, in health and harmony with Nature. We are living in a "Natureopolis."

## Sidewalks and NC Priorities on September BSCL Agenda

Back to the drawing board on Neighborhood Conservation Projects! At the February BSCL meeting, improvements to the intersection of Arlington Boulevard and South Abingdon/Henderson Street for pedestrian and bike safety were voted to be the neighborhood's top priority for funding.

Upon further investigation by Arlington County Department of Environmental Services (DES) staff, it was discovered that VDOT has plans in the works for improvements to several Arlington Boulevard intersections, including this one. DES has prepared a concept design to illustrate the preliminary VDOT plan, and it appears to address the safety concerns we have with the intersection. Work on this project is estimated to be two to five years out.

So at the September BSCL meeting, we will revisit the street, sidewalk, lighting, and park improvement projects that remain to be done in the 2008 Barcroft Neighborhood Conservation Plan. Coincidently, a resident of 8th Street South has submitted a request on behalf of several neighbors to complete the sidewalk in front of 4609 8th Street South through the County's Missing Links Program. This particular project will be discussed and voted on separately at the September meeting.

Other projects to consider include the list of other outstanding sidewalk projects in

the 2008 plan. In February, we also considered the parkland potential of the former Vepco substation on South Pershing Drive. Linda Gaines volunteered to investigate the status of environmental cleanup done through the County and EPA. She has done some excellent research, and although it is unlikely to be something to pursue as a Neighborhood Conservation project just yet, having a community position on the future use of this land would be beneficial. •


