Monthly Happenings

President's Report by Chris Kupczyk

We had a good turnout for our October meeting. We approved this year's proposal for the Neighborhood Conservation Advisory Committee. We will submit a request to clean up the longabandoned Virginia Power substation on Pershing, between 5th and 6th Streets, as an open green space or park. The project would most likely involve some retesting of the soil to determine what contaminants are still present -- and therefore still leaking into Grandma's Creek and Four Mile Run, as well as posing a safety hazard to humans and animals. This would be followed by whatever cleanup and soil replacement would be necessary. The site currently is zoned for commercial/industrial use, which is held to less stringent standards in terms of the level of contaminants allowed in the soil.

Be sure to join us for our next meeting at 7:30 p.m. on November 3, at the community house. Our guest will be Cecilia Cassidy, the new executive director of the Columbia Pike Revitalization Organization (CPRO). She is looking forward to updating us on CPRO's recent activities and what her plans are for CPRO's future. In lieu of a December meeting, our annual holiday party will take place on December 1. We'll resume our regular monthly meetings in January.

Does Your Sidewalk Need Repairing?

At the October BSCL meeting, an attendee informed us that she recently tripped and fell over a displaced section of sidewalk along Buchanan Street. If you are aware of similar tripping hazards in the neighborhood involving sidewalks, you can report the problem to the county at https://transportation.arlingtonva.us/streets/curbssidewalks/. Click "report a sidewalk problem," then, on the next screen, enter "concrete and

sidewalk repair" in the search box. If you can take a photograph of the sidewalk, you have the option of uploading it with your request.

You also can report the problem by calling 703-228-6570. As stated on the county's web page, the county "will replace sections of sidewalk that are displaced by greater than a half-inch, have cracks in excess of a half-inch wide, have severely spalled (deteriorated surface) concrete or otherwise present a tripping hazard."

Barcroft Resident Subject of New Children's Book

Former Barcroft classmates in the late '70's, Angela Fairwell and Loki Mulholland have co-authored a beautifully illustrated children's picture book, "She Stood for Freedom: The Untold Story of a Civil Rights Hero Joan Trumpauer Mulholland." Joan is a lifelong Arlingtonian who volunteers at Barcroft School. There is a second book by the same title, with more text and many primary

sources, for upper elementary and middle school students. Both books recount the student-led Civil Rights Movement of the early '60's, and encourage today's students to take a stand against the problems they see in the world -- a "Do the Right Thing" message. Choose a Green and Clean Landscaping Company

Do you hire a company to take care of your lawn and property? Landscaping companies registered with the Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation as "Green & Clean" agree to follow landscaping practices to reduce the amount of fertilizer runoff into our streams and rivers. Such practices include testing the soil for nutrient content before applying fertilizer, adhering to caps on the amount of nitrogen applied, sweeping up fertilizer that lands on hard surfaces, and recycling grass clippings. If you contract with a landscaping company that uses your County-provided collection services to dispose of yard waste, you are responsible for coordinating with your contractor to ensure that any yard waste is placed in your County-provided yard waste

cart, paper bags, bundles or household containers and set out for collection after 5 p.m. on the day prior to your service day. Your contractor may not set out yard waste in plastic bags for collection. Plastic isn't compostable and won't be collected.

sempervirens) and hummingbirds will come. This stunning vine has red and yellow trumpet shaped flowers that bloom from April to June and intermittently until frost. It produces a red berry that attracts Purple Finch, Goldfinch, Her-



mit Thrush, and American Robin. Native Americans used the leaves to treat asthma,

> sore throats, and coughs. Coral Honeysuckle can be grown on a fence, trellis, or arbor or used as a ground cover.

The Virginia Native Plant Society selected Coral Honeysuckle as its 2014 Wildflower of the Year.

Trail Tips from WalkArlington and BikeArlington

For Cyclists:

Bikes roll faster than people walk. Pedestrians may not even hear you coming. Some things you can do to share the way:

- Warn pedestrians at least 2 to 3 seconds before passing them. Bells are best. Use verbal warnings only when necessary.
- Slow down and give pedestrians at least an arm's length of clear space when passing.
 This will help avoid collisions and near misses.
- Use bike lanes when available. Remember,
 on sidewalks, pedestrians always have the
 right-of-way. Ride cautiously and respectfully.

For Pedestrians:

Cyclists move faster than you. Most

cyclists will want to pass you on the trails. Listen for their warnings and know what to do:

- Stay to the right. If walking side by side, be prepared to walk single file.
- Don't stop suddenly or step to the left without first checking behind you. If you want to stop, step off the trail.
- Riding on the sidewalk is permitted almost everywhere in Arlington. If a cyclist needs to get by, try to make room.

For Everyone:

- Obey traffic rules and signs.
- Be considerate of other users.
- Stay alert, especially when wearing earphones.

Whether on two wheels or two feet, courtesy will help get you there.

Arlington remains highly desirable and demand is strong. October sales have outpaced new listings so far this month. The trend is not just local – it's national. Because of lower housing inventory and few choices for buyers, the sales pace is slower especially in the moderate to lower price points. Affordability in Arlington is a challenge. At an open house last week, I noticed that out of 80 open houses (single family homes), there were only 19 homes under one million dollars. Low supply puts upward pressure on prices. The DC area is mirroring the rate of property appreciation nationally, which is roughly 5%. While the current market favors sellers, some homes are still overpriced. Roughly 35% of housing in the local market place experiences a price reduction in any given week. Interest rates are at 3.5% now with speculation that they may rise soon.

Paint Tips - quality is critical and Sherwin Williams is popular. It's more expensive, but it covers well and ultimately looks better. For a finish, a

room's function and lighting are a factor. While glossy sheens are more durable, and absorb less moisture, imperfections in drywall will stand out the most. Use gloss on trim for that reason and its durability. Satin and eggshell are mediums that hide imperfections better and can handle some moisture, common in bathrooms & kitchens. Flat and matte hide imperfections well, used on ceilings and walls. Pick a color that is trending (SW Cool Platinum is a favorite). Grays and beiges on walls provide an amazing neutral look - more popular than plain white. Use white on ceilings and trim.
