of target plants and invasive removal techniques will be explained.

The site includes a number of invasive plants including English Ivy, Bush Honeysuckle, Garlic Mustard, Golden Bamboo, Porcelainberry, Asian Wisteria and Japanese Honeysuckle.

Participants should dress appropriately and bring work gloves and pruners, loppers, etc., if they have them. It's a good idea to mark your tools with your name. Extra gloves and tools will be available. Poison ivy is present in the area and may be difficult to identify, so long sleeves and pants are a must.


writing every day.

Technology Devices in Schools to be Discussed

Arlington County Public Schools (APS) has announced a "Community Discussion on Acceptable Use Policy" related to technological device use by students. The meeting will be held Monday, March 5, at 7 p.m. in the cafeteria of Wakefield High School (1325 South Dinwiddie Street).

According to APS, the School Board adopted the first of two acceptable use policies for student devices used for learning on February 1. This policy is specific to federal guidelines and filtering. The second policy will

be discussed as an information item at the March 22 School Board meeting and a School Board action item on April 5. Community members interested in the second policy — which will address topics such as internet safety, digital citizenship, rights and responsibilities, and shared ownership —

should attend the March 5 Community Discussion mentioned above. For more information about the Acceptable Use Policy process and timeline, visit www.apsva.us/engage/acceptable-use/.

Many teachers, parents, administration and community members are concerned with 21st century technology's effect on both children and adults. The School Board will be addressing issues and getting feedback on

subjects including:

- Internet addiction;
- Skill displacement (i.e. What happened to cursive?);
- Discrepancies of screen use throughout APS (i.e. discrepancies in which schools have device-free lunch times, smart phone bans, extra blue light filters, and iPads for home use);
- Current national and county data on rates of ADHD and depression;
- Exposure and access to inappropriate content and actions (i.e. porn, sexting,

on-line bullying, etc.);

- Privacy issues;
- Parental opt-out/opt-in choice related to their child's use of these devices;
- Efficacy and data related to the benefits vs. concerns of this technology.

There is much research to be gleaned and awareness to be built. If we work together, we can make this technology helpful. For more information, check out: www.humanetech.com.

We all need to work together and I urge attendance at the March 5 Community Discussion meeting to help us do just that. Everyone wants what's best for our kids and ourselves. I hope to see you there!



Low housing inventory has been a chronic problem in the area, especially in Arlington. 5+ months of inventory is a balanced market and Arlington has about 1 months' supply due to the rate of absorption.

From 1/1/18 to date, 279 properties have gone under contract in Arlington, 94 of them were single family homes. With rising rates some buyers are acting now, while others wait for more housing inventory to arrive. Historically the 1st quarter to the mid-2nd quarter of the year are prime times to be a home seller.

Rates are expected to continue climb, which could erode buyers' purchasing power. In recent multiple contract situations, some buyers are reluctant to offer much over list price. The demand is high, yet most buyers are hesitant unless they perceive they are getting a great deal, hard to do in a seller's market.

Market Values versus Assessed Values. Arlington County's average assessed value of residential property (condos, town houses and single-family homes) is now \$640,900, up 3.8% from \$617,200 last year. It's hard to apply a 3.9% to all homes since an Arlington home has an average market value 10% higher than

its tax assessment, which varies in sectors and zip codes. One point to realize is just because your tax assessment might not have increased, doesn't mean the market value of your home did not increase (and vice versa). Every year homeowners can appeal their assessment, and in a few cases, it might work out. Check out the county website for information since Arlington provides an informative website.
