Candidates Speak to Civic Federation

The Arlington Civic Federation held a membership meeting September 4 and heard from candidates for the U.S. House of Representatives as well as the County Board and School Board. This traditional Arlington campaign kickoff saw a packed auditorium at Virginia Hospital Center's auditorium. Highlights follow. The general election is Tuesday, November 6.

For Virginia's 8th District in Congress, Democratic incumbent Don Beyer cited four major issues that argue for increasing his party's numbers in the House of Representatives: curbing climate change; fighting bigotry; preserving affordable health care; and promoting economic development. Republican challenger Thomas Oh criticized career politicians for failure to represent their constituents, noting that Federal health care provisions risk exces-

sive government spending. In Q&A, both candidates opposed separating children from their parents at the border. Oh called for increased legal immigration and reduced illegal, while Beyer advocated Congressional action for comprehensive reform like what was nearly adopted in past sessions. Beyer stressed the need for stable infrastructure funding, noting inflation had eroded the Federal gasoline tax used for this purpose. Oh argued taxes were going up and should instead be reduced to allow more economic growth.

The County Board seat on the ballot is held by John Vihstadt, running as an independent, who said he had delivered on his pledges — e.g. eliminating the planned Columbia Pike streetcar, establishing a County Auditor, getting Artspace into the tax base, cutting spending, and increasing

what you experience when you turn your yard into a wildlife sanctuary. Fall is the time to put

in the plants that will bring this parade to your door.

Most perennials and shrubs and some trees do best when planted in the fall. The cooler, wetter weather puts less stress on the plants while their roots continue to grow well into winter. If you want to enjoy butterflies and birds, choose native plants, as those are the ones that support our local wildlife.

In Northern Virginia, we are lucky to have three native-plant only nurseries, as well as several other commercial nurseries that are labeling their native plants. More information is available at the Plant NOVA Natives website.

Volunteers Needed to Tutor Local Students

AHC, Inc. (formerly Arlington Housing Corporation) is recruiting volunteers to work with teens or elementary students. One hour a week can make a huge difference to a student's success.

Helping with homework is just part of why volunteers are so critical to the program. Volunteers also form valuable relationships

with students and inspire and encourage them to succeed. Whatever your experience or your time frame, we welcome your support!

AHC's year-round program provides a comprehensive support system from elementary school through high school and during the summer when low-income children are particularly susceptible to learning loss. The educational programs encourage academic excellence and personal growth in a nurturing and stable environment. Because programs are located in the communities where families live, they are a stable and consistent part of the children's and their families' lives.

This strategy is working. ALL the high school seniors in the program have graduated from high school since tracking began in 2008. All graduating seniors are going to college this year. Elementary students' reading and math skills are improving consistently, too.

Volunteers are being sought in several areas. Afterschool Volunteers: Volunteers work one-on-one or work with a small group of elementary-aged students (k-5th grade) and help youth complete homework, study for tests, and also build literacy and math skills. Volunteer one day a week for an hour between 3 and 6 p.m., Monday through Thursday.

Teen Tutoring Volunteers:

Volunteers work one-on-one with middle and high school students (6th – 12th grade) and help teens complete homework, study for ex-

ams, and improve in challenging subject areas. Onsite staff members provide vital support through mentoring and coaching. Volunteers are needed one hour once a week, from 6 to 8 p.m., Monday through Thursday.


College and Career Readiness: Help teens study for standardized tests, apply for financial aid and scholarships and write essays. Volunteers work one-on-one with a high school senior throughout the school year. Meeting times are flexible and arranged between the volunteer and student.

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
governmental openness. He emphasized economic development through increasing commercial occupancy and streamlining permits. Democratic candidate Matt de Ferranti outlined priorities of schools, energy/ environment, and affordable housing. Specifically, he endorsed plans to educate every child, achieve 100 percent renewable energy by 2035, and support housing for county workers like teachers and first responders and for seniors. In Q&A, he named technology, medicine, clean energy and cyber security as sectors to help grow the local economy, while stressing his commitment to Democratic Party ideals like education and upward mobility. Vihstadt explained that he'd switched from the Republican Party to Independent status to counter hyperpartisanship. Both responded that voting accessibility and security need improvement. De Ferranti criticized the commercial vacancy rate, arguing it was shifting

the County's funding burden onto real estate taxes. Vihstadt argued for checks and balances in County government, preferring a clash of ideas to one-party control of the Board.

Barbara Kanninen, current School Board chair, is up for re-election, opposed by Audrey Clement. Both are listed as partyindependent. Kanninen called for supporting the "whole child," e.g. health in addition to pure education, emphasizing student skills, fair pay for teachers and staff, and capital improvements to address growth. Clement criticized shortages in the quantity and quality of school facilities and the lack of transparency in decision-making, e.g. renaming Washington -Lee school. Questions raised the issue of greenery, with Kanninen proclaiming trees were "in my blood" and noting plans to build schools up rather than out to preserve green space. Clement, however, argued that the school system in the County's biggest culprit

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in the alarming canopy loss. She also criticized Arlington schools' high construction costs and low test scores compared to Alexandria and Fairfax, lauding their use of repurposed office buildings. Kanninen responded that the Board has commissioned an audit to drill down on costs, but has in fact pursued economical construction while developing fine, purpose-built facilities, adding that some double as community centers and parks. Regarding diversity and boundaries, Kanninen argued that a majority of Arlington's schools are ethnically

mixed, but acknowledged that demographics and geography create complex problems that, she implied, the Board should not address through busing. Clement argued that minority students in Arlington tend to do poorly in all its schools regardless of location; she felt better pedagogy and technology would address this problem.

Softening Home Prices in the Near Future?
