Hat's Off to Retiring Barcroft News Editor

Ten months of the year, this newsletter is delivered to Barcroft residents and represents a group effort by many volunteers in our neighborhood. The key job, however, is of the editor, who gathers articles, ads, and local tidbits to produce a readable and reliable newsletter.

Alyssa Ford Morel turned in her editor's visor with last month's issue, after 10 years volunteering as the newsletter editor. In reflecting upon changes since 2013 (when a dozen eggs cost \$1.93, taking 'selfies' was all the rage, and Disney released the film Frozen), Alyssa noted two recurring concerns in our neighborhood - traffic and the tension between print and online media.

Traffic concerns have been a long-time issue and today Barcrofters are discussing the impact of increased car commuters through our neighborhood streets, speeding and volatile driving, and accidents and property damage. Barcroft News—over the last 10 years

—reflects this as the most recurring topic as so much else has changed.

Tension between printed media and electronic means of communications is a daily challenge for most of us, and at BSCL meetings over the years there have been discussions about our neighborhood only relying on chat lists and other online outlets. But the consensus remains that there is a value to something that is printed, in hand, to peruse at leisure without a device. There are many in our community who are not online and it is important to keep them connected. Alyssa noted that in our modern society, we are used to things being done by others; so much 'just comes to us.' Our printed newsletter is a departure from that norm and Barcroft can take pride in that 10 times a year, all our residents have an opportunity to review information about our community first-hand. (Note: The Barcroft News was first published in 1903!)

As those who have attended recent BSCL meetings are aware, BSCL received a grant from the Arlington County Historic Preservation Fund to support necessary renovations to the Community House, including replacing the roof and having the exterior repainted. The new roof is on, and the painting will hopefully be completed by the time this issue goes to press.

The neighborhood has changed a lot since the Community House was built in 1908—about the only constant is the state of paving on Columbia Pike. To me, the house serves as a reminder that even as the physical structure of the neighborhood changes, we can maintain the continuity of the community. The house has served as a gathering place for the community, in all its forms, for over 100 years. And so I'm excited to return to the Community House for our monthly BSCL community meeting on November 2 for the first time since the pandemic started.

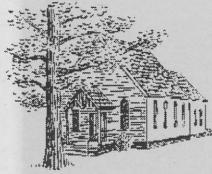

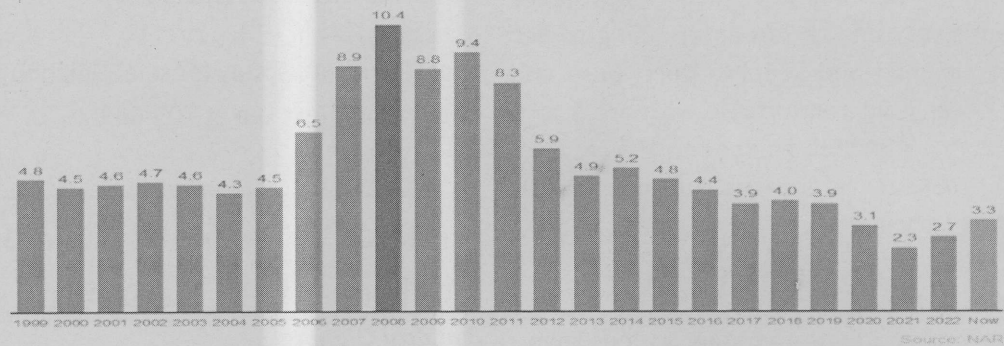

For the housing market to crash, there would have to be too many houses for sale, but the data doesn't show that happening. While housing supply grew compared to last year, it's still low. The current months' supply is below the norm. The graph below shows this more clearly. If you look at the latest data, compared to 2008, there's only about a third of that available inventory.
