Roye Lowry will be the speaker. He will describe the potential for economic development of Arlington. His recent talk on this topic to the Arlington Civic Federation impressed everyone with its description of Arlington's transition from a "bedroom" community of single-family homes to a complex urban community with high rise offices and over one-half its citizens living in apartments.

Mr. Lowry's talk will touch on the implications of Metrorail, taxes and Arlington's Long Range Improvement Program for the future quality of life in the County.

This meeting should help us understand better the issues which will be addressed at the seminar on Arlington's Economic Development which will be sponsored jointly by the Civic Federation, the Chamber of Commerce and the League of Women Voters on May 7, at the Ramada Inn.
