NOVEMBER MEETING AT BARCROFT SCHOOL

The November meeting of the Barcroft School and Civic League (BSCL) will be held at the newly renovated Barcroft Elementary School, 625 South Wakefield St. The school's new principal, Miriam Hughey-Guy, will be on hand to welcome us and show us around the remodeled school. The program will be a visit by our own Barcroft police officers on the beat, getting to know the neighborhood (and vice-versa) as part of the Arlington County Police Department's program for community-based policing. Come and meet them so you will know who you are calling if a problem occurs. The meeting starts at 7:30 PM.

Candidates Night: October's Meeting

The BSCL conducted its annual Candidates Night last month. Two races were featured: Arlington County Board and the 49th District of the Virginia House of Delegates. All three County Board candidates attended. It's always a pleasure when County Board members come to Barcroft because we can ask about neighbor-

hood issues. One neighbor asked about the lack of a sidewalk on "Dead Man's Curve" on Pershing Drive, and Ellen Bozman said she'd follow up on our problems in getting this approved project going. For the 49th District race, three of the four candidates attended, including incumbent/neighborhood resident Karen Darnier. The discussion was wide-ranging and lively, and the chance to meet the candidates face-to-face is always illuminating.

Vote!!!!

On Tuesday, November 2, Barcroft and the rest of Arlington will vote. Voting is the best way to make sure your neighborhood's concerns are never forgotten. We need a good turnout for this non-Presidential-year election, where each vote will count heavily. This year our polling place moves back to Barcroft School, 625 S. Wakefield, now that the school's renovation is finished. As always, the polls are open before your alarm clock goes off and stay open until 7 PM. If you missed Candidates Night and want to talk to a neighbor about the choices, call anyone listed in this newsletter. They all have their biases, of course, and will gladly share them with you! The important thing is that you **vote**.

Our Savior Food Program

Our Savior Lutheran Church at 825 S. Taylor St. began a "Food for the Hungry" program last June. They have prepared spaghetti to serve to as many people as come for a free monthly dinner. Each family or group is then also given a bag of groceries to take home. The next dinner will be Saturday, November 20, from 5 to 7 PM. All are invited! Ten to twenty-five people have come to the dinner each month, and the church is looking for ways to spread the word to increase the number of diners.

The Church will gladly accept donations of nonperishable foods—especially meals in a can, such as spaghetti, stew, or macaroni and cheese—to be distributed to the hungry. For more information call the church at 892-4846.

NCAC Recommends Four-Way Stops

In a letter to County Board Chairman Jim Hunter, the Neighborhood Conservation Advisory Committee (NCAC) requested that the County reconsider its restrictive policy on four-way stop signs. Hunter had requested a list of potential four-way sites during a meeting with NCAC, and the list of nine neighborhoods compiled by the NCAC Traffic Management Subcommittee includes Barcroft. Specifically: "Install stop signs on 8th Street South at South Taylor, Wakefield, and Buchanan Streets, converting these three intersections from two-way stops to four-way stops."

Our Neighborhood Conservation Plan recommended a traffic study to determine whether

New Restaurant to Open

R.C.W. Entertainment is renovating some of the vacant space next to Goodwill on Columbia Pike, across from Roy Roger's. In addition to operating a restaurant featuring Liberian food, R.C.W. is applying for a live entertainment Use Permit from Arlington County and a beer/wine/liquor license from the Virginia ABC Board. Members of the Barcroft community met with the applicants, the Arlington County Planning Commission, and the Columbia Pike Revitalization Organization to get more information and to discuss the proposal. R.C.W. actually initiated the meeting, which was a very pleasant surprise! They came prepared with a Question and Answer sheet about their plans.

The BSCL has written a letter to the County asking that billiards be deleted from the use permit, that weeknight hours end at midnight

instead of 2 AM on Wednesday and Thursday, and that several conditions be placed on the use permit. Those conditions include limiting the initial use permit to six months, requiring a security officer to be on duty from 9:30 PM to closing, designating a Community Liaison, and not permitting "Happy Hours." The letter notes that there is a range of opinion in the neighborhood, from strong opposition to a new nightclub on Columbia Pike to welcoming the new establishment as the first of its kind whose management has shown sensitivity to neighborhood concerns. One neighborhood jazz band leader has already contacted R.C.W. hoping to book his band there.

The new restaurant/nightclub, named the Oasis, hopes to open around Thanksgiving. Barcrofter Talmadge Williams has volunteered to be our liaison with R.C.W. Entertainment, so you may call Talmadge at 920-7006 if you have observations about the restaurant's operations after it opens. For a copy of the BSCL's letter to the County or the Question and Answer sheet prepared by R.C.W. for our meeting, call Scott Allard.

additional stop signs or other measures would slow traffic and reduce cut-throughs on these three streets. It also recommended a four-way stop at the intersection of Pershing, Wakefield, and Third St. S., which NCAC did not include in its list.

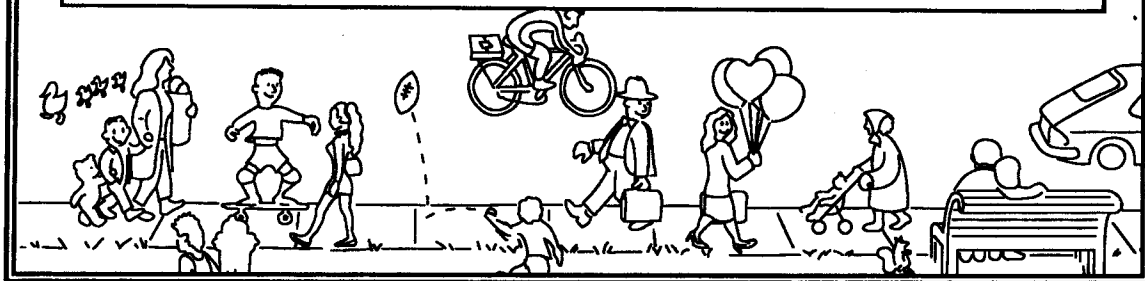

Park and Stream Cleanup

The first joint BSCL/Sierra Club stream cleanup was held on October 16. Two Barcrofters joined about a dozen Sierra Club workers in cleaning up the Bike Trail entrance north of Columbia Pike, both sides of the bridge over Four Mile Run, and down into the lower trail by Four Mile Run. The volunteers collected dozens of Thunderbird and Budweiser bottles and placed them in the recycling bins. They also filled a number of other bags with trash. The several homeless people and hangers-out in the area generally ignored the improvements made to their chosen areas as well as the people making the improvements.

Last fall the BSCL voted to participate in Arlington County's "Adopt-A-Park" program by helping keep the area north of Columbia Pike and the W&OD Bike Trail clean. The Sierra Club has adopted the streambed, so their efforts complement ours. We will schedule future cleanups to correspond with their days.

Leaf Collection Begins

The County's new pamphlet on leaf collection shows evidence that someone is determined to get it right this year. Those who hate leaf piles can pick up free leaf bags at 15 locations, including the Long Branch Nature Center, the TJ Rec Center, and the Courthouse. The pamphlet explains why the special biodegradable bags are most efficient. Home composting is encouraged as an alternative. The leaf vac will make two passes for leaves raked to the curb. Collection zones now have neighborhood names, so you can call the Leaf Collection Hotline at 358-6565 for updates on when the vacuum will arrive in Barcroft.

November Lawn Care

"Dr." John of the Merrifield Garden Center has the following tips for November lawn care:

- ✦ Remove as many leaves as possible. Do not leave them piled up in spots throughout the lawn because it will kill the grass in those spots by the time spring arrives.
- ✦ Liming in the late fall is a good idea, particularly if you did not lime in the spring. You should not, at any one time, put down more than 50 lbs. of lime per 1,000 sq.ft. If the lawn needs more lime, give it a couple of applications a month apart or apply half in the spring and half in the fall. You need 75-80 lbs./sq.ft. when weeds like chickweed, knotweed, and wild strawberry invade the lawn and 90-100 lbs./sq. ft. if you see wild violet and green moss.


